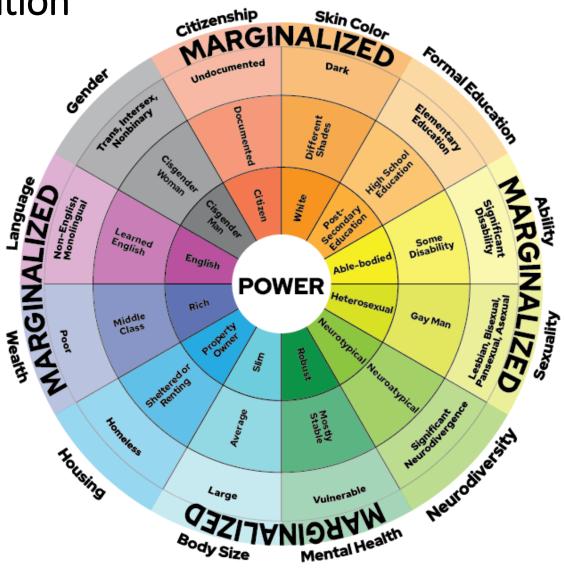

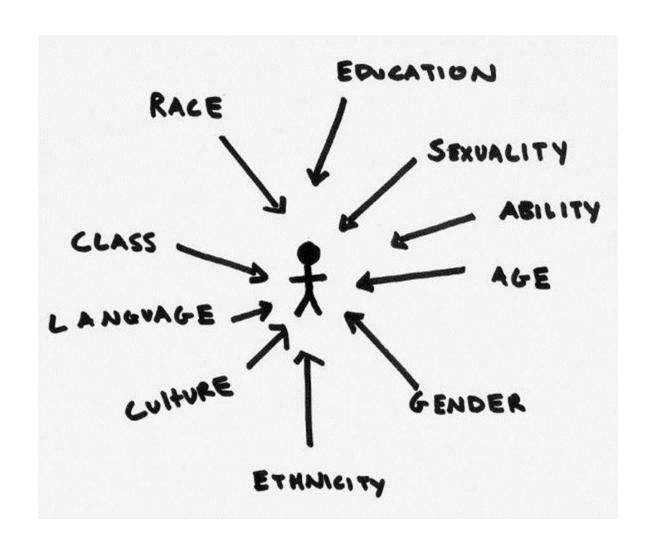

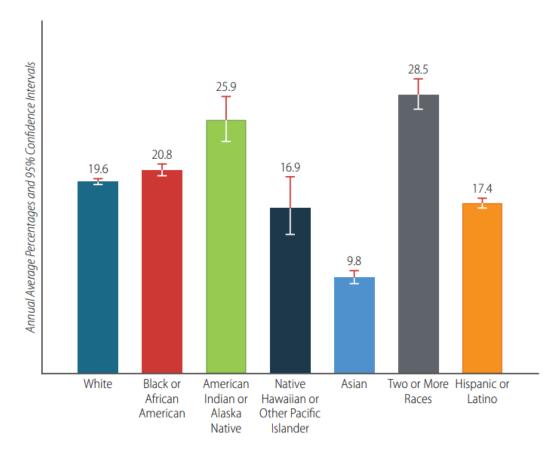

FIGURE 3.1 Illicit Drug Use in the Past Year among People Aged 12 or Older, by Race/Ethnicity: 2015–2019, Annual Averages



Estimates of past year illicit drug use among people aged 12 or older were highest for people reporting:

- two or more races and for American Indian or Alaska Native people (28.5 and 25.9 percent, respectively)
- followed by the estimate for Black people (20.8 percent)

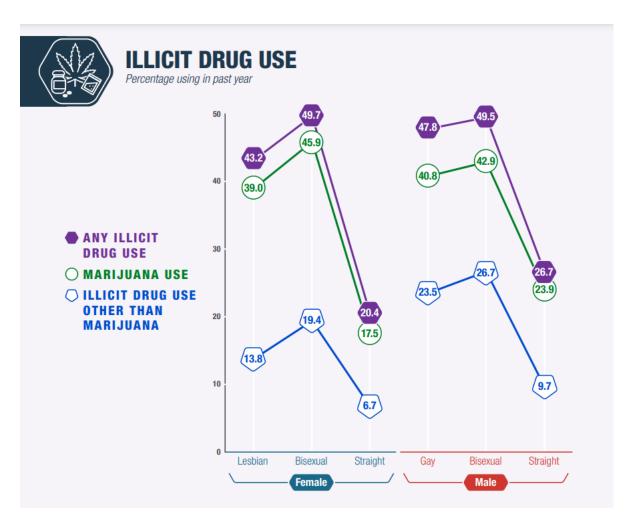

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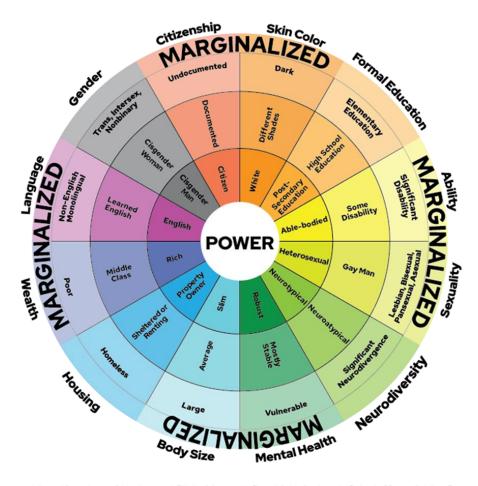
Sexual minority males were 2 to 3 times more likely than straight males to have used illicit drugs other than marijuana in the past year.

Sexual minority females were 2 to 3 times more likely than straight females to have used illicit drugs other than marijuana in the past year.
